





Our Goal: To strengthen the programming and capacity of nonprofits working to improve the quality of life for all MetroWest residents

IN 2022

\$3.57 million distributed

- \$2.67 million through DISCRETIONARY FUNDS
- \$1.23 million through non-DISCRETIONARY FUNDS

Hunger Relief

Organizations that primarily work to alleviate food insecurity

Town Funds

Specifically benefit individual towns: Lexington, Sherborn,
 Southborough, & Wellesley

Youth Development

- Organizations that primarily serve youth
- Reviewed by FFMW Youth in Philanthropy (YIP) students
- Invitation Only

Environment

- Multi-year grants to promote and support the conservation of the waters in our region.
- Recognizes the importance of water conservation to public health, our natural ecosystems, and our regional economy.



Eligibility APPLIES TO BOTH PROGRAMS

Applicants must...

- Be a 501c3 nonprofit (or apply under a fiscal sponsor)
- Serve MetroWest
- Not discriminate in the hiring of staff or the provision of services on the basis of race, religion, gender or gender identity, sexual orientation, age, national origin, or disability

Ineligible organizations or requests include...

- City/town agencies (includes libraries)
- Individuals
- Schools (includes private, public, charter, pre-K, or Chapter 766)
- Pass-through grants
- Healthcare or disease-specific organizations
- Organizations solely focused on youth (BOTH)
- Organizations solely focused on hunger relief initiatives (BOTH)
- Human service organizations providing arts-based programs to clients (Arts & Culture)



Review Criteria APPLIES TO BOTH PROGRAMS

Grant decisions and amounts will be determined based on a variety of factors, including:

Organization's size

Location of impact in MetroWest and your role in the ecosystem

Organization impact and reach, including population served, number of households served, type(s) of programming offered, etc.

Alignment with the Foundation's priorities as outlined



2023 Arts & Culture

Our mission for the 2023 Arts & Culture Grant Program is to invest in local nonprofit organizations whose primary mission is to provide access to arts & cultural initiatives in the region.

General operating grants

up to \$10,000

OR 10% of your annual operating budget (whichever is *less*)



Focus & Priorities

Proactively providing equitable access to arts education, visual arts, or performing arts initiatives for marginalized & under resourced residents

Celebrating and/or preserving the region's vast history and cultural heritage

Encouraging and increasing opportunities for culturally diverse voices and communities to create and participate in arts & cultural activities

Promoting arts & culture as an engine of social and economic vitality in the region



Fostering innovation and community collaboration

2023 Human Services

Our mission for the 2023 Human Services Grant Program is to invest in local nonprofit organizations whose primary mission is to deliver basic needs and wrap-around social services to individuals and households in MetroWest that address identified community challenges.

General operating grants

up to \$20,000





Focus & Priorities

Organizations that serve under resourced or underrepresented individuals and households, including:

- > Low-income households
- ➤ Homeless individuals
- Immigrant and/or refugee populations
- Older adults
- > Women and girls

- > Individuals with disabilities
- Veterans and/or active-duty service members
- ➤ LGBTQIA+ communities

Organizations that address one or more of the following through strong mission and program alignment:

- o Housing and homelessness prevention
- o Economic opportunity and security

- o Safety and wellbeing
- o Mental and behavioral health

Organizations with the ability to address identified community needs through sustainable client-focused solutions.



The Foundation has a strong interest in supporting organizations focused on prevention-based models.

 - Applications due Friday, September 15th at 5:00PM
 - Site visits or follow up— Oct. 16th Nov. 3rd
 - Decisions sent via email week of December 4th
- Terms & Conditions
 - Grant reporting completed by September 13th 2024
 - Publicity Guidelines (Sent with Grant Acknowledgement)


