Trade and Construction Expo: Empowering Tomorrow's Workforce

On April 1, 2025, the Workforce Development Action Project awarded grant funding to Metro South/West Youth Connections to host the third annual Trade and Construction Expo. Aligned with the Project's mission to expand vocational pathways for under-resourced youth, the Expo has become a key workforce development event. Since its launch in 2023, student attendance has grown by 93%, with 560 students participating in 2025.
